A Season of Waiting and Preparation



Advent is a season of expectant waiting and preparation

for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas. The term is a version of the Latin word meaning "coming".

Latin *adventus* is the translation of the Greek word *parousia*, commonly used to refer to the Second Coming of Christ. For Christians, the season of Advent anticipates the coming of Christ from three different perspectives. "Since the time of Bernard of Clairvaux (d.1153), Christians have spoken of the three comings of Christ: in the flesh in Bethlehem, in our hearts daily, and in glory at the end of time." The season offers the opportunity to share in the ancient longing for the coming of the Messiah, and to be alert to His Second Coming.

Advent is the beginning of the Western liturgical year and commences on four Sundays before Christmas.



Practices associated with Advent include keeping an Advent calendar, lighting an Advent wreath, praying an Advent daily devotional, lighting a Christingle (Christ light), as well as other ways of preparing for Christmas, such as setting up Christmas decorations, a custom that is sometimes done liturgically, through a hanging of the greens ceremony.

The equivalent of Advent in Eastern Christianity is called the Nativity Fast, but it differs in length and observances, and does not begin the liturgical church year as it does in the West. The Eastern Nativity Fast does not use the equivalent *parousia* in its preparatory services.

Within the week of Christ the King and the conclusion of Ordinary Time we look forward to the promise of Christ "that all may be one" (John 17:21). This fall is the 500th anniversary of the Reformation with its current meaning and challenges for the Catholic Church as well as the Protestant Churches. All are invited to a Catholic-Lutheran dialogue at Our Lady of Lourdes Parish Hall, on November 28. The evening will include opportunity for discussion. We welcome our neighbors from Resurrection Lutheran Church.

Our Speakers will be Rev. Diane Bowers, Ph.D., a theologian, Luther scholar and pastor in the Sierra Pacific Synod, ELCA. Diane was ordained in 2002, and earned her Ph.D. in Systematic Theology with a dissertation on Martin Luther's theology of the mystical union with Christ, experienced through faith and Father George E. Griener, SJ, has taught historical and systematic theology at the Jesuit School of Theology and the Graduate Theological Union since 1989. He completed his doctorate at the University of Tübingen, Germany, with a dissertation on 19th century philosophy of religion.

From the desk of the Ministry Coordinator

Pope Benedict on the Benevolent Plan of God (Part 1 of 3) Dear Brothers and Sisters, At the beginning of his letter to the Christians of Ephesus (cf. 1, 3-14), the apostle Paul raises a prayer of blessing God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ - a prayer that we have just heard - that introduces us to live the season of Advent, in the context of the faith. The theme of this hymn of praise is God's plan for man, defined in terms full of joy, wonder and gratitude, as a "benevolent plan" (see 9), mercy and love. Why does the Apostle raise this blessing God, from the depths of his heart? Because he looks at his work in the history of salvation, culminating in the incarnation, death and resurrection of Jesus, and he contemplates how Heavenly Father has chosen us even before the creation of the world, to be his sons in his only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ (cf. Rom 8:14 s.; Gal 4:4 f.). Therefore we exist from eternity in God, in a major project that God has kept within himself and decided to implement and to reveal in "the fullness of time" (cf. Eph 1:10). St. Paul helps us to understand, then, how all creation and, in particular, man and woman are not the result of chance, but a loving plan to respond to the eternal reason of God with the creative and redemptive power of his Word which creates the world. This first statement reminds us that our vocation is not simply to exist in the world, being inserted in history, or even just being a creature of God, it is something greater: it is being chosen by God, even before the creation of the world, in the Son, Jesus Christ. In Him we exist, so to speak, already. God contemplates us in Christ, as adopted children.
