Year of Mercy

Pope Francis has declared 2016 as the Year of Mercy. The Year of Mercy begins on December 8, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, and ends with the Feast of Christ the King, 2016. It may be good for us to have a brief reflection on mercy and what it entails.

We need to both give and receive mercy. There could be people who wonder how can I give mercy? Well, it can be done in many ways. Practicing the corporal works of mercy is a sure way to do it. The **corporal works of mercy** are: to feed the hungry; to give drink to the thirsty; to clothe the naked; to shelter the homeless; to visit the sick; to ransom the captive; to bury the dead. Among these ransoming the captive may sound unfamiliar. It refers to rescuing people who are prisoners of war, people who are kidnapped for ransom, or held as political prisoners etc. Amnesty International is an organization in our times that works for such causes.

Amnesty International (commonly known as Amnesty and AI) is a non-governmental organization focused on human rights with over 7 million members and supporters around the world. The stated objective of the organization is "to conduct research and generate action to prevent and end grave abuses of human rights, and to demand justice for those whose rights have been violated." Amnesty International was founded in London in 1961.

We can give mercy by doing **spiritual works of mercy**. They are: to instruct the ignorant; to counsel the doubtful; to admonish sinners; to bear wrongs patiently; to forgive offences willingly; to comfort the afflicted; to pray for the living and the dead. These are easy enough for most people to do and are a help for one's own spiritual growth.

Question of the Week

For Adults:

In what areas of your life do you need God's forgiveness right now? What Advent practice would assist you in expressing your repentance?

For Children:

What do you want to ask God to forgive you

for? What can you do during Advent to show you are sorry? Marycare I heard about Marycare from its president, my dear friend Anne Bates, and I was immediately struck by the grass-roots nature of this organization. During the past 20 years Marycare has helped impoverished communities in Argentina, the Philippines, Haiti—communities that have been oppressed and isolated for ethnic, religious, racial or political reasons. Now Marycare is in southern Nigeria, working under the guidance of local Nigerian leaders and Fr. Emmanuel, a Nigerian priest who is pastor of 2 parishes in Hartford, Connecticut. First Marycare dug a well to bring clean water to the priest's home village of Umuoduwa, one of the five villages of Ejemekwuru, a town of 10,000 people in Imo State in rural Nigeria. This means not only that the mortality rate has declined dramatically, but also that the children previously taking hours to fetch dirty water from the river can now be in school. Marycare has also recently built a medical clinic in Umuoduwa which is already attracting patients from the other villages in Ejemekwuru, and also in the region at large—an area with no nearby medical facilities. Within the next 2 months they will be sending a large container of beds and equipment to the clinic. Donations will be used for medicines, and for paying local doctors and nurses to educate and cure people. Nurse educator Rose teaches patients as they wait to see a doctor that sickness is not caused by evil spirits, but often by poor hand-washing, and/or by not seeing a doctor when, for example, a baby begins to get chest congestion. These people are victims of the Biafra Massacre in which 1 &1/2 million to 3 million people were starved to death for trying to become independent in 1996-70. Now they are finally through Marycare receiving help where other organizations have failed because of corruption. Marycare always collaborates with the community leaders already in place--that way there is a mutual giving and receiving among all. 95% of Marycare's donations go directly to its programs because of its completely volunteer staff in the USA. Please consider making a donation to this extremely worthy charitable foundation whose mission it is to work with the poorest of the poor.
